

Report of a Sustaining Improvement Inspection (Involving Action Short of Strike) in January 2020

Sustaining Improvement Inspection of Newmills Primary School, Dungannon, County Tyrone (501-2719)

Introduction

The previous inspection in November 2016 evaluated the overall effectiveness of Newmills Primary School as having a high level of capacity for sustained improvement. Since the inspection, the enrolment has increased steadily and currently stands at 100 children. A sustaining improvement inspection (SII) was carried out on 27 January 2020.

The trade unions which make up the Northern Ireland Teachers' Council (NITC) have declared industrial action primarily in relation to a pay dispute, and also workload and other management issues. The industrial action includes non-co-operation with the Education and Training Inspectorate (ETI). Prior to the inspection, the school informed the ETI that none of the teachers would be co-operating with the inspection. The senior leadership co-operated with the inspection in relation to safeguarding responsibilities. The ETI has a statutory duty to monitor, inspect and report on the standards of education and professional practice among teachers under Article 102 of the Education and Libraries (Northern Ireland) Order 1986. Therefore, the inspection proceeded and the following evaluations are based on the evidence as made available at the time of the inspection.

Focus of the inspection

Owing to the school's participation in industrial action:

- the inspection was unable to focus on evaluating the extent to which the school is capable of demonstrating its capacity to effect improvement through self-evaluation and effective school planning; and
- a line of inquiry was not selected by the school from the development plan priorities.

Key findings

• The year 6 children spoke positively about their experiences of school life. They highlighted their enjoyment of physical education, art, shared education and after-school activities. The children expressed their appreciation of the support from the staff and explained how feedback from their teachers helps them set targets and improve their work. The children reflected maturely on how the various roles and responsibilities they carry out develop their skills, including teamwork and problem-solving, enable them to contribute to decision making and provide them with opportunities to support the younger children. • It will be important that the employing authority, school governors and the staff plan for, and manage, issues related to the sustainability of the school provision and school budget in order to address the current and future needs of the children and the staff.

The ETI was unable to evaluate fully:

- a line of inquiry; and
- the quality of learning and teaching within the classrooms.

Safeguarding

During the inspection, the school provided evidence that the arrangements for safeguarding children reflect broadly the guidance from the Department of Education. The children report that they feel safe in the school and that they are aware of what to do if they have any concerns about their safety or well-being. However, owing to the action short of strike, the ETI was unable to evaluate fully the outworking of the arrangements for safeguarding in the school.

Conclusion

Owing to the impact of the action short of strike being taken by the staff, the ETI is unable to assure parents/carers, the wider school community and stakeholders of the quality of education being provided for the children. The school is a high priority for future inspection with no further notice.

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
