

Sustaining Improvement Inspection of Dunmullan Primary School (201-2378)

Introduction

The previous inspection in November 2013, evaluated the overall effectiveness of Dunmullan Primary School as good¹. In the interim period, a member of staff was appointed to the post of acting principal in September 2015 and to the post of principal in September 2016. The enrolment remains steady at 36 children and includes two children in a reception group.

A sustaining improvement inspection (SII) was conducted on 17 January 2017.

Focus of the inspection

The inspection focused on evaluating the extent to which the school is capable of demonstrating its capacity to effect improvement through self-evaluation and effective school development planning. The school also provided evidence of provision for safeguarding as part of the inspection.

The lines of inquiry during the SII were:

- the co-ordinators use of monitoring and evaluation of the learning and teaching to bring about improvement in standards; and
- the outcome of the review of the reception provision.

Key findings

- The staff have developed effectively the role of the co-ordinators and the
 processes for monitoring and evaluating the children's learning in literacy and
 numeracy using a range of evidence. The school's internal data indicates a
 reduction in the number of children underachieving; almost all of the children are
 achieving good to very good standards in literacy and numeracy including those
 with additional needs.
- The staff have identified appropriately that the children benefit from their increased levels of motivation to learn from exploration and problem-solving activities. A more robust, whole-school approach to monitoring and evaluating the children's scientific and information and communication technology skills is a timely, ongoing priority for development.
- The review of the reception provision for a small group of children included more appropriate planning for provision of a pre-school programme based on the requirements of the Curricular Guidance for Pre-School. The early years assessment system for learning through play remains an ongoing priority for development.
- It will be important that the employing authority, school governors and the staff plan for, and manage, issues related to the sustainability of the school provision and school budget, in order to address the current and future needs of the children and the staff. In addition, the school governors need to review further,

the admission criteria to enrol reception age children, throughout the school year, particularly, those who do not have a funded pre-school place.

Safeguarding

During the inspection, the school provided evidence that the arrangements for safeguarding continue to reflect² the guidance issued by the relevant Departments.

Conclusion

Dunmullan Primary School continues to demonstrate the capacity to identify and bring about improvement in the interest of all the learners. The ETI will continue to monitor how the school sustains improvement.
